pūrus -a -um: clean, pure, innocent
rāmus -ī m.: branch
raucus -a -um: harsh-sounding, noisy
refertus -a -um: crammed, bursting with
resistō -ere -stitī: stand still, halt, stop short
rōdō rōdere rōsī rōsum: gnaw, eat away, erode
rota -ae f.: wheel
rubeō -ēre: redden, blush
sanguinulentus -a -um: accompanied by bloodshed; blood-red
senectūs -ūtis f.: old age
situs -ūs m.: neglect; physical deterioration
sōbrius -a -um: sober, moderate

suspendium -ī n.: act of hanging oneself, a hanging; gallows
